In the past ten years, those 65 and older grew from 40.3 million to 55.9 million, and grew at a rate higher than any 10-year period, except for 1880 to 1890. By 2050 there will be over 82 million 65 and older.

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

For decades the "Blue Cross in Key West" stood as a beacon of hope and Christian faith over our community. Originally built in 1937 to commemorate the Centennial of the Archdiocese of Dubuque, the cross overlooks Mt. Olivet cemetery on land that was once part of the Bishop's Farm as

In 1962 the Knights of Columbus and other partners added the blue neon lighting that made it visible for miles and miles. That really made it a landmark and very unique as well. Travelers entering Dubuque and Dubuquers returning home were delighted to see it as a sign that they were

Over the years the neon lights were constantly needing repairs as the lighting was fragile and storms would frequently break them, resulting in constant update. In addition, the trees surrounding the cross grew tall and made the cross almost impossible to see, especially when the leaves were on the trees.

Recently a gentleman who lived where they could see the cross from their living room window shared a touching story. Years ago when his wife was sick and there were no more reatment options, they had hospice services and moved the bed to their living room where they prayed nightly while viewing the cross. He said it gave his wife peace and hope.

Centennial Cross Incorporated is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization formed with the purpose of rebuilding, relighting and maintaining the cross and they have been fundraising to complete that task so that future generations can also find the faith and hope they need in the cross.

In June a new cross that stands 137' tall and is lighted with blue LED lighting was erected and is now shining brightly. It is a completely new structure with all new concrete foundation, new steel and all new wiring. This structure was designed to last for many many years.

Conlon Construction was hired to be the general contractor for the project. "We're proud to have been selected for this project, especially since my grandfather, R.F. Conlon, built he original cross in 1937," said Tim Conlon, Chief Executive

Fundraising for the project has been ongoing for many years and to date over \$300,000 has been collected of the \$410,000 needed. "We are asking for the public to help us to reach our goal," said Tim McCaffery, President of Centennial Cross,

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

# Introducing a new pet to your cat

**DEAR PAW'S CORNER:** I recently adopted a year-old need to be separated. puppy. "Max" is a friendly, wellsocialized dog, and during the trial stay a month ago, my 10-year-old cat, "Nora," seemed to tolerate him. Well, on the second day that Max was home, he started barking excitedly. Nora sprang up and attacked him, cornering Max on the sofa. She batted him around the snout several times. Now, Max slinks out of the room anytime that Nora appears. How can I make peace between them? — *Gerry G., Manchester*, New Hampshire

**DEAR GERRY:** I'm sorry to hear that! Introducing a new pet into an established household can be stressful for both pets and sometimes unpredictable.

And any negative interactions that occur — from hissing and barking to an all-out boxing match — can make future harmony nearly impossible to achieve. One or both pets may begin to exhibit behavioral issues like aggression, soiling in the house, chewing and scratching, and more.

For the foreseeable future, you'll need to manage and monitor all interactions between Max and Nora. As soon as they begin to react negatively, they

Reintroduce the two gradually. I recommend taking Max for a nice, long walk before each meeting so that some of his puppy energy is worked off beforehand. Work intensively with Max on basic commands like sit, stay, lie down and come here. When Max is in the room with Nora, have him sit or lie down close to you — they don't have to meet face to face. Limit interaction time to five minutes or less at first, then gradually increase the time.

If you never worked and did not pay Social Security taxes, and have a spouse who worked, you may be eligible for spouse's benefits. You must be at least 62 years old, and your spouse must already be receiving retirement or disability benefits. If you are a younger spouse, you may be eligible for benefits if you have a qualifying child in your care. By a qualifying child, we mean a child who is under age 16 or who receives Social Security disability benefits.

"Lord, what would You have


What would You have me do? What would you have








This ca. 1967 photograph shows the east side of the 700 block of lowa street just prior to urban renewal. Kies-Henschel Monument Co. (700 lowa) was founded by Henry Kies in 1926. In 1961 it was purchased by Vince Brannon and moved in 1966 to Central Ave. Next is the 720 Inn (720 Iowa St.) and formerly known as the Holiday Inn Bar (1954-1966). Tri State Blueprint (756 Iowa) started in 1942 and remained at that location until 1967 when it re-located to Central Ave. To the far left is Belsky Motor Co. which started in 1913 at 6th & lowa. In 1923 it moved to a new building at corner of 8th & lowa. The company sold Buick and Cadillac vehicles. In 1965 it became known as Shike-Richardson, Inc. # The OIG Always Comes Through

Things are going to be different in 2025. If there's one thing I hope, it's that the Veterans Affairs Office of Inspector General isn't hit with any budget or staffing reductions. As time goes on we need them more than ever to dig out, investigate and expose all the problems in the VA.

for toxic exposures - as well as training for the VA medical staff to do those screenings. Within a short time, screenings had been done on 4 million veterans out of the 9 million who were enrolled in VA health care. That's approximately 45% of the total. Training for staff, however, didn't come close. When additional training was required, only 21.4% of staff completed it, which means that a lot of veterans were screened by staff who hadn't done all of their training.

Then there is the matter of

communication that the VA OIG exposed: A "package manager" computer program at the VA bundles up the documents for a veteran's claims and then sends them off to a printer. The VA OIG discovered that, because nobody was paying attention to the problem, over 2 million packages weren't printed ... because nobody hit the "send" button. The veterans, therefore, did not receive the communications from the VA. which might have been asking for more evidence for a claim to be processed or notification about a claim decision and information about options for responding to that decision.

Equally valuable are the The PACT Act of 2022, for frauds that the OIG nails. example, required screenings A recent scam involved a pharmaceutical company that offered a particular test kit, claiming that the kit could diagnose a certain condition. Then they were able to push the very expensive therapy drug they produced for that condition. Kickbacks were involved, of course. The company ended up paying \$47 million for their scam.

Keep your fingers crossed. In a perfect world, the VA OIG will maintain an adequate budget and staffing. Doubling it would be better.


elderly, need a personalized door to door service that can work for their schedule.

### Mechanical Banks

Mechanical banks function as both a toy and a useful, even educational, device. Deposit a coin and a figure dances or jumps into the air, an animal swallows the coin, a flag is raised or another action is performed. They entertain children and encourage them to save money.

Now, antique mechanical banks, particularly the castiron examples made in the 1800s, sell for impressive prices. Later mechanical banks can sell well, too.

This lithographed tin "Watch Me Grow" bank was made in the 1940s by General Metal in Canada and sold for \$615 Canadian (about \$459 U.S. currency) at a sale by Jon Dunford, Miller & Miller Auctions, LTD. It is shaped like a cylinder and decorated to look like a figure of a man in a colorful suit holding a sign saying, "Watch Me Grow TALL with Coins Large & Small." The coin slot is on top of the man's hat. The figure's "legs" are hidden inside the cylinder. A spring inside the bank causes the cylinder to rise when coins are dropped in, appearing to lengthen the "legs" and make the

figure grow taller.

I inherited a huge amount of jewelry from a relative. I don't know what to do next. Most seem costume (not sure), but I would like to hold a sale or auction. What do I do and how?

Look for marks on the • back of the jewelry, then search Kovels.com and other online sites for information about the makers. Check "sold" prices on eBay and liveauctioneers. com, and "asking" prices on other sites, to see what similar jewelry sells for. If you think you have fine jewelry made with real gold or precious stones, take it to a jeweler for an opinion on authenticity and value, and perhaps a sale. Contact an auction house that sells jewelry. If they sell jewelry, they also buy it. Go to flea markets to see what costume jewelry sells for. If you plan to hold an online sale or auction, include a clear photo, size, material, maker, any interesting history and a good title that includes keywords to attract buyers' attention. If you decide to sell the jewelry yourself, you must charge sales tax. It's a lot of work but good jewelry sells for fair prices.

**TIP:** Set your sundial at noon, June 15. Place it so the shadow falls on the 12.
